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# Pastoral Letter - from the Revd Dr Janet Anderson-Mackenzie

Preparing to write this letter I have found myself asking, what is my favourite story about working together being better than staying as an individual?

There's the story of the vision of heaven and hell with the soup and ridiculously long spoons. I quite like that one, where heaven and hell are the same except that in hell everyone is starving and in heaven people are feeding each other with the spoons.

Then there's the story of the enormous turnip, where everyone has to work together to get it out of the ground.

But I think still my favourite story is that of the stone soup, told in various guises where there is a starving village which receives a visitor. They explain to him that there is no food, and he says that's fine, please can I have a pan full of water? So, he sets the pan of water over the fire in the centre of the village and puts in a stone. After a while he tastes the soup and says, 'it's lovely but I think it could just do with a carrot'. Someone has one carrot which they bring. Then someone finds an onion, and another half a cabbage, then another a handful of barley, and someone a pinch of salt, and so on. Before long they have a lovely stone soup which they can share out with the whole village.

Then when the stranger packs up to continue the villagers say to him, 'Please come again and make your lovely Stone soup.' The stranger smiles and then just walks away.

Jesus talks about working together, about loving each other and caring for each other. Then Paul transfers this into our understanding of church community by using the image of the church being the body of Christ. All of us being one part of the body which needs each other, not able to function properly without sharing with each other.

Perhaps the most famous bible passage about this is 1 Corinthians chapter 12 and my favourite verse is 21: The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' It seems such a good example of interdependence.

Many of you know that my job is not just to work in the most Northern part of the Churn Valley benefice. Nor is it just to help David Minns out across the whole group. I have a three-year contract to work on building benefice cohesion and mission. I don't yet know what this is going to look like precisely. There isn't yet a plan, but the aim is to have a much more detailed plan by the

end of September. In some ways I have brought the stone for the soup, and I am just asking around to see what people have that we could put in the soup. My aim is that in three years' time I won't be leaving with a wry smile, but you will all know how to make the soup together.

David and I have talked about asking people about my role and we have come up with a series of questions which will help inform the action plan to begin in September.

I'm hoping that we can gather answers to these questions from as many people as possible, certainly churchwardens and PCC members as well as other people who are part of our church community here in the Churn Valley. Below are the questions, which may come to you again in a different way, by email or by paper, but please do get the answers back to me if you possibly can.

What is the best thing for you and your church about being part of the benefice?

What do you think my job is?

What do you hope I will be able to achieve or facilitate in the three years of my post?

What would be the one best thing you think I could do in my time here? What aspects of spiritual growth do you hope to see in your church community and the benefice in the next three years?

What thing do you wish the church community could stop doing? What thing do you think the benefice could do better together than it is at the moment?

I very much didn't feel that way at the time, and often in small rural parishes we don't feel that, but it's true. We just need to pray and work out how to put it all together.

I want to say thank you so much to everyone for your warm welcome to the benefice, and your patience while I am still finding things out because I'm new. My prayer is that over the next three years we can all work together to grow as the body of Christ here in the Churn Valley.

# The Celtic Church and Celtic Worship (Part 1 of 2)

A number of our churches in the CVB have now experienced Celtic worship, so it seems appropriate to explain a little of how it differs from "normal" Anglican worship, and how these differences came about. While written descriptions of the early Celtic church may be limited, there are other sources that allow reasonable conjectures to be made. However, this can only be a brief introduction of the topic. The terms "Celtic church" and "Roman church" will be used here to distinguish the two main strands of Christianity, though in reality there would have been considerable variation in religious practices.

Christianity came to Britain during the second century (100 - 200AD) from two principal directions. The first probably involved Celtic missionaries arriving from Ireland. They established a number of religious centres, especially on the West side of the country, spreading the Gospel from there. Iona is probably the best known of the centres of the Celtic church, with Lindisfarne being another. Certainly, these first efforts at mission bore fruit; the early Christian author Tertullian writing around 200AD, noted that Britain

had received and accepted the Gospel.

The second direction was from the continent. Undoubtedly, converted Roman soldiers may have evangelised at a low level, but the main thrust of mission would come after Emperor Constantine had adopted Christianity as the official Roman religion in 312AD. The influence of the Roman church was shortlived however, since pressures in Europe caused the withdrawal of Roman forces and society from Britain by around 400AD. The two strands of Christianity probably then had little contact for 200 years and evolved separately.

Around 600AD Pope Gregory dispatched a mission under Augustine of Canterbury to evangelise the Anglo-Saxons and assert papal authority over the indigenous (Celtic) church. Augustine was to be the bishop over the whole of Southern Britain. He held a series of meetings with the Celtic elders in which he attempted to assert his authority and reform certain aspects of Celtic worship that differed from the Roman pattern.

The Northumbrian cleric Bede recorded an account of the

meetings, and related how the Celtic elders, unsure of how to treat Augustine, consulted a wise hermit. The hermit said that their response should reflect how Augustine met them; if he rose to greet them, he was a humble man, and they should listen to him and accept his authority. If, on the other hand he remained seated. he was a proud and arrogant man and should be rejected. In the event, Augustine remained seated. In the subsequent discussions, all of Augustine's demands were rejected. particularly his claim of authority.

One of the differences that caused problems between the Celtic and Roman churches was the way Easter was calculated. Roman and Celtic churches used different methods, such that the date of Easter could differ between the two by as much as four weeks. The Synod of Whitby was convened in 664AD to resolve this (and other) issues.

For various reasons King Oswiu of Northumbria (which was then the principal kingdom in England and whose territory included much of Yorkshire) adopted the customs of the Roman church. The Celtic church did not, at the time, change their practices and withdrew to their centres. particularly Iona. The decision fostered the separation of the two strands and saw the consequent decline in the importance of the Celtic tradition. At this point the centre of church administration in the North of England also moved from Lindisfarne to York.

The Celtic tradition has seen a revival of interest in recent years. Iona has become a major destination as a place of Christian retreat and the community publishes considerable quantities of worship resources. In Part 2 of this article, the differences in the approach to worship between Celtic and Roman traditions will be examined.






Can you spot the snails who were very happy to settle into their new home right away? We are really looking forward to our next Forest School session!

# **Recipe: The Original Coronation Chicken!**

Why not celebrate the Queen's Platinum Anniversary by going back in time 70 years and enjoying the original Coronation Chicken created by Rosemary Hume for Queen Elizabeth II's Coronation lunch on 2 June 1953?! It was later included in the Constance Spry Cookery Book, first published in 1956. This recipe serves 6-8 people.

**Preparing the meat** - Poach two young roasting chickens with carrot, bouquet garni, salt and peppercorns in water and a little wine, to barely cover, for about 40 minutes or until tender. Allow to cool in the liquid. Joint the birds, remove bones with care.

To serve - Mix a small amount of the sauce (enough to coat the chicken) with a little extra cream and seasoning. Mix the chicken and the sauce together, arrange at one end of a dish, coat with the extra sauce. At the Queen's Coronation an oblong dish was used with a rice salad at the other end of the dish. The salad was made of rice, peas, diced raw cucumber and finely chopped mixed herbs, all mixed in a well-seasoned French dressing.

#### Ingredients for the Cream of Curry Sauce:

- 1 tbsp oil
- 50g/2oz onion, finely chopped
- 1 dessert spoon curry powder
- 1 good tsp tomato purée
- 1 wineglass of red wine
- $-\frac{3}{4}$  wineglass water
- A bay leaf
- Salt, sugar, a touch of pepper

- A slice or two of lemon and a squeeze of lemon juice
- 1-2 tbsp apricot purée
- 450ml/<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> pint
   mayonnaise
- 2-3 tbsp lightly whipped cream.



#### To make the Cream of Curry Sauce:

Heat the oil, add onion, cook gently for 3-4 minutes, add curry powder. Cook again for 1-2 minutes. Add purée, wine, water, and bay leaf. Bring to boil, add salt, sugar to taste, pepper, and the lemon and lemon juice. Simmer with the pan uncovered for 5-10 minutes. Strain and cool. Add by degrees to the mayonnaise with the apricot purée to taste. Adjust seasoning, adding a little more lemon juice if necessary. Finish with the whipped cream.

#### News from our NHS Trust - Anne Davies

I have frequently referred to the problem of ambulance delays resulting from hospitals' inability to discharge patients. This month, our Chief Executive Deborah, became lop sided and unable to speak. Her husband, having heard her lamenting ambulance delays, drove her directly to the hospital. She recovered after initial urgent treatment followed by a trip to Oxford to have a clot removed. The following day she tweeted thanking those who cared for her but also saying: 'but I can't get one thing out of my head. What if my husband hadn't been there and my daughter had called for an ambulance, and I'd been put in the Cat 2 "stack"?' The thread, insightful and honest, and typically 'Deb's' attracted national interest.

'You've turned a heartening message of personal recovery into a powerful call to arms.'

'The call to arms around ambulance services & hospital 'back door' inc. Social Care so desperately needed too. NHS needs more CEOs demanding Govt action.'

'Ambulance response times are a whole system issue including primary, acute, community & social care. A proper funded plan to develop the social care workforce would be top of my list too!'

Released this week was the disturbing news of an avoidable baby death in the trust three years ago. I was reassured to read the trust response: 'The Trust acknowledges that there were failures in care, which were fully and independently investigated by the Healthcare Safety Investigation Branch (HSIB). "We have fully accepted and implemented the safety recommendations made by the HSIB in their report to ensure that all possible lessons are learnt from Margot's tragic death."' It was further confirmed at the recent board meeting I attended that all the seven requirements of the Ockendon report were being addressed.

A positive to celebrate this month is a successful research study - "Childhood Cancer survival is a global postcode lottery2. The study investigated the impact of the pandemic on childhood cancer across 39 Countries during the COVID-19 pandemic. Mr Noel Peters from the trust was the chief investigator for this jointly led project between the trust and the University of Oxford. It has been highly recognised including receiving an award from the *American Association for Cancer Research*.
